What should we do if a brother or sister has wronged us or has stumbled into sin? (Matthew 18:15a)

Should we really be surprise when one has stumbled into sin or error? (Matthew 18:7)

As a Christian, who is to take the initiative to find resolution and restoration with our Christian brother or sister? (Matthew 18:15)

Is the matter immediately to become public or a matter of gossip? (Matthew 18:15b)

If the offender doesn't want to recognize the sin/problem or disagrees with the offended person judgement, what should the approach be then? (Matthew 18:16; Deuteronomy 19:15)

(Over)

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If the matter is still not resolved, then whose is notified of the problem, the general public? (Matthew 18:17a)

If this last attempt within the (local) church is not resolved, what then? (Matthew 18:17b)

What is meant by the action "to bind" or "to loose", especially with respect to the reconciliation that is desired in this text? (<u>Matthew 18:18</u>; <u>Deuteronomy 19:15</u>)

By putting this in context of <u>verse 16</u>, what are the two or three asking for in <u>verses 19-20</u>? (see also <u>Malachi 3:16</u>)

Religious leaders of the time thought that a person should forgive their brother or sister three time for a transgression. (Yoma 86b, 87a) How many time did Jesus say we should forgive our brothers and sisters? (Matthew 18:22; see also Genesis 4:24)

Finally, Jesus tells a parable about a (Gentile) king, his servant, and a fellow servant. How much did the servant owe the king versus how much did the second servant owe the first? (Matthew 18:23-34)

The king forgave the servant his debt, did the servant forgive his fellow servant his debt? (Matthew 18:28-30)

What was the king's response when he found out the servant had persecuted the fellow servant for the little he owed? (Matthew 18:31-34)

In the end, what should we do when we are owed some restitution for wrongs to us by our brother and sister? (Matthew 18:35)
